/ YEAR A

ENTRANCE ANTIPHON: 1 PT 2:2

Like newborn infants, you must long for the pure, spiritual milk, that in him you may grow to salvation, alleluia.

READING I: ACTS 2:42-47

An idealized vision of what life was like in the early communities.

The text highlights the four aspects of Christian life: formation, communal life, the “breaking of the bread” (Eucharist and other community meals), and prayer.

PSALM RESPONSE: PS 118

“Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, his love is everlasting.” As noted for Easter Sunday, this individual song of thanksgiving becomes for us Jesus’ own celebration of the resurrection and our assurance that the “rejected stone” of the crucified Christ has become the “cornerstone” of our faith.

READING II: 1 PT 1:3-9

The reading begins by quoting a hymn that might be called “A New Birth.” The rest of the text praises those who hold onto a faith that does not require proof.

GOSPEL: JN 20:19-31

In John's version of the Easter narrative, Jesus’ resurrection and ascension happen on that first Easter, as does the gift of the Holy Spirit sent on the apostles.

Thomas requires proof, but he is not blessed. Jesus blesses those “who have not seen and have believed.”

COMMUNION ANTIPHON: JN 20:27

Bring your hand and feel the place of the nails, and do not be unbelieving but believing, alleluia.

THIS EASTER, UNLIKE ANY OTHER

(The following is an excerpt from Archbishop Wilton Gregory's “What I Have Seen and Heard” Easter 2020 column for the *Catholic Standard* newspaper and website of the Archdiocese of Washington.)

“Jesus often described the kingdom of God with images like the finding of the single sheep who had strayed from the 99, or a measure of yeast planted in a portion of unleavened dough, or the woman who lost one valuable coin and then searched the entire house until she found it. Each of those comparative stories has something to reveal about our experience of the Triduum this year as a treasure that has been removed from us and once we can reclaim it, we ought to value it even more intensely. Some people may worry that our experience of Holy Week this year with livestreamed observances or home-bound services will diminish our desire to share in the church celebrations more festively assembled together next year. I doubt that, since the treasures of the Lord's stories about God's kingdom emphasized the intense joy of rediscovering a treasure that had been misplaced. Like all of you, I long for the time when our churches will be filled with folks who gather to celebrate our faith with palms, candles, choirs, oils, incense, darkness and fire. This year, we miss those moments when we annually use ordinary human elements to enter into the very mystery of the presence of God Himself. Next year, please God, we will recover the joy of being together for those festive ceremonies.”

POPE FRANCIS

Today's Gospel is the account of the Apparition of the Risen Christ to the disciples gathered in the Upper Room. Saint John writes that after greeting his disciples, Jesus says to them: "As the Father has sent me, even so I send you". After saying this, he makes the gesture of breathing on them and adds: "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven." This is the meaning of the mercy that is presented on the very day of Jesus' Resurrection as the forgiveness of sins. [...] This visible sign of his mercy brings with it peace of heart and joy of the renewed encounter with the Lord.
