MUSIC AND LITURGY NOTES

There are two different categories of music: presentational and participatory. Church music, by its very nature, is participatory music. The moment church music becomes presentational, its purpose has failed. Recently, the Parish Council has recommended ways to "enhance" and diversify the liturgical experience at St. Jane's. One of their directions is aimed at contemporizing the music at Mass. I hesitate to use the terms "traditional" and "contemporary" because there are various stigmas and stereotypes associated with them in regards to church music. For the purpose of this discussion and of the understanding of the parish council, "traditional" church music will mean common hymnody and music played by the organ, while "contemporary" church music will denote popular styled music played by the piano and other instruments. Since a few of our neighboring parishes offer an "alternative" weekend Mass with contemporary church music, I have been asked to experiment with this paradigm at St. Jane. One big difference between us and our neighboring parishes is that we will rely mainly on dedicated and competent parishioners to volunteer as musicians to make this effort successful in lieu of paid professionals.

In consideration of the Parish Council's request, I presented the following four questions:

Who is asking for contemporary or alternative music? Right now, the Parish Council has asked for an alternative Mass with contemporary music.

What does the Parish need? The parish needs more active participation from the congregation. If contemporary music inspires more active participate in the Mass, then it will have proven itself to be a need.

What do we want to achieve? By fostering an alternative Mass with strictly contemporary music, we aspire to achieve a more enthusiastic and prayerful worship experience. This attempt is especially targeted toward engaging more youth involvement.

How will we know it is working? This is not about Mass attendance. All of our Masses are already very well attended. The assessment of having an alternative Mass with contemporary music will be evaluated in two ways. First, is there enhanced congregational participation? And secondly, is there more involvement in parishioners participating in contemporary music ministry as choir members, cantors, or instrumentalists? In order to meet these two goals, we need enthusiastic participation from the pews, and volunteers' time and talent as music ministers.

If we miss meeting the goals of the Parish Council's request and if my questions are left unanswered, then our music ministry has the unintended chance of becoming presentational rather than participatory. That is not the result that we want. It is my philosophy that the Parish needs a broad offering of musical styles, which is what I aim for with the music scheduled at each of our weekend Masses. However, if an "alternative" Mass with only contemporary music helps our parishioners to enhance their faith in worship, then trying this at St. Jane would be worthwhile. Aside from contemporary music, now that I have been in your parish for two and a half years, I would also like to bring up what I consider to be a greater and more urgent need, which is the fact that we are completely lacking a children's music ministry. Caution was brought up at the Parish Council meeting that not all youth are attracted to contemporary music. It is my professional desire to put my effort into training our youngest parishioners in music ministry. That is a real and desperate need for us; a substantial children's music ministry is successful in offering proven results to both the participants and parishes. If someone were to do an outside needs assessment of our music ministry, this would be at the top of their list.

Following the recommendations of the Parish Council, for the next few weeks, we will experiment with the request for an alternative Mass with contemporary music at the Sunday noon and 5:00 pm Masses. In order for this kind of change to be successful, we will need your help as outlined above.

I will end this column to address the concerns that many of you have in regards to the role of the pipe organ. Most parishioners love our new organ, and both Andrew Vu and I are honored and privileged to play it for you. Many of you offered great financial gifts so that the instrument could be built. You did this knowing that its music would be a lasting manifestation of your sacrificial giving in worship and song. It is beyond gratifying to witness our parishioners lift up their voice in sung prayer with the organ and I always feel the presence of those to whom the organ honors in memory. A few parishioners have mentioned rather disparaging comments about the organ over the past few years; however, I find their complaints more pointed towards me as the organist rather than the instrument itself. The organ provides us with beautiful music. It is not my intent to diminish its presence during Mass and I hope to find ways to continue to use the organ at the noon and 5:00 pm Masses during this time of experiment so that those of you who gave so generously for its creation can continue to hear it make beautiful music.


