MUSIC & LITURGY NOTES: FUNERALS (PART IV)

At the Funeral Mass, the community, having been spiritually renewed at the table of God's word, turns for spiritual nourishment to the table of the Eucharist. As at any Eucharistic liturgy, in partaking of the Body of Christ, we are given a foretaste of eternal life in Christ and are united with Him, with each other, and with all the faithful, living and deceased. It is for this reason that the Liturgy of the Eucharist is essential during a Catholic funeral. At the beginning of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, family members or friends are asked to bring up the gifts of bread and wine that the priest will then offer during the Eucharistic Prayer. Once communion has been distributed and the vessels have been purified, we turn to the last part of the Funeral Mass, the Final Commendation and Farewell.

The Final Commendation is a final farewell by the members of the parish and community, an act of respect for one of our members, whom we now entrust to the tender and merciful embrace of God. This act of last farewell **>**

also acknowledges the reality of separation and affirms that the community and the deceased, baptized into the one Body, share the same destiny—resurrection on the last day. During the final commendation, we sing the "Song of Farewell," whose text affirms hope and trust in the paschal mystery. The text of the Song of Farewell is specified in the Order of the Liturgy, and thus cannot be replaced with a song that features a different text. During the Song of Farewell, the casket is incensed, signifying respect for the body as the temple of the Holy Spirit. Following the priest's closing prayer of commendation, commending the deceased into God's hands, a procession is formed to the place of committal (gravesite). This procession mirrors the journey of human life as a pilgrimage to God's kingdom of peace and light, the new and eternal Jerusalem.

There are three more topics in regards to funerals that I would like to discuss: cremation, music, and preplanning. I will talk about the latter two next week, but for now, a word on cremation. Although the Church recommends the custom of burying the body be observed, cremation is permissible, assuming proper motives. As stated in the *Order of Christian Funerals*, the Church prefers that cremation take place after the funeral liturgy and before the committal service. "The cremated remains of a body should be treated with the same respect given to the human body from which they come. This includes the use of a worthy vessel to contain the ashes, the manner in which they are carried, the care and attention to appropriate placement and transport and the final disposition. The cremated remains should be buried in a grave or entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium. The practice of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air, or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains in the home of a relative or friend of the deceased are not the reverent disposition that the Church requires." (*OCF*, no. 417) In funerals were an urn is present instead of a casket, the Introductory Rite of the Mass is slightly modified and the remains are placed on a stand at the steps of the altar before Mass begins.




