### MUSIC & LITURGY NOTES:

One of the aspects of the Catholic faith that continually intrigues me is its vast history, including the fact that what we celebrate together on Sundays was also celebrated on earth by our grandparents, their grandparents, and by all of the saints in heaven dating back to the early Church Councils that took place around the fourth and fifth centuries. Catholics are part of a universal Church that was established by Christ and carried forth by his Apostles, whose lineage continues to this day with our Holy Father. Although the Mass was prayed in Latin for the greater history of the Church, the relatively new introduction of the vernacular in the last five decades has not erased any of the relevance of earlier rituals.

One part of the Mass in particular that I feel is often overlooked is the Eucharistic Prayer. As the gathered faithful, we are invited to listen attentively to the words of the Eucharistic Prayer and to join in on the responses. Since we hear the Eucharistic Prayer every week in church, we might take these words of the Mass for granted and not ►

give them much thought, but I encourage you to pay close attention to their significant meaning of thanksgiving and sanctification. For the General Instruction of the Roman Missal to claim the Eucharistic Prayer as the “center and summit of the entire celebration”, these words of the Mass constitute our core beliefs as Catholics.

On any given Sunday, Catholics around the world pray together, in various languages, one of four universal Eucharistic Prayers (there are others for special occasions, but they are not universal to the worldwide Church). Within these prayers, we acknowledge ourselves as “fellow-citizens with the saints and domestics of God” (Eph. 2:19). The first Eucharistic Prayer, also known as the “Roman Canon,” is the longest and oldest of the four. It is nearly unaltered from its conception dating back to the sixth century. Let that sink in: Catholics have been offering this prayer for over 1500 years! Don’t let the fact that this is the longest form of the Eucharistic Prayer intimidate you; its length only adds about two minutes to the Mass. Part of the beauty of this first prayer is that it invokes the names of Mary and Joseph, the Twelve Apostles (resting upon the chief corner-stone Christ, the Apostles have thus become the foundation of the Church, which, consequently, is called and is Apostolic), and of twelve early martyrs (five popes, one bishop, and five lay people). After the consecration, additional saints are beckoned, including John the Baptist, Ignatius, and Cecelia (the patron saint of music!). Although the first Eucharistic Prayer can be prayed at every Mass, it is almost always said on high Solemnities such as Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost. The second Eucharistic Prayer is the shortest of the four. This is the prayer that you will most commonly hear during weekday Masses. Its shorter text eliminates the mentioning of saints and quickly segues into the consecration of the bread and wine. (An odd fact: A theologian once told me that church scholars drafted this Eucharistic Prayer while sitting at a café in Rome.) The third Eucharistic Prayer is most apt for memorials of saints, and even allows the priest to invoke the name of the patron saint of a parish church, cathedral, diocese, or land. Lastly, the fourth Eucharistic Prayer is reserved for special occasions, due to its fixed preface prayer (text leading up to the Sanctus), which recalls the history of salvation.

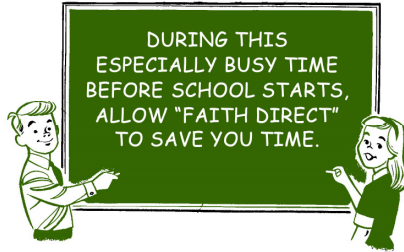
