MUSIC & LITURGY NOTES: WORSHIPPING WELL (PART 3)

Before reading this week's column, please open your hymnal to #614. You'll notice that this is the hymn, *Holy God, We Praise Thy Name*. Now look at the hymn and listen. Do you hear anything? If not, are you really listening? Hmmm... So, here's the thing: What we call music may be printed on the page in the hymnal, but it really doesn't exist until we bring it to life by making noise. Now, imagine the hundreds of persons around you together singing the first line, "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name." If you really use your imagination, you'll understand how our collective voices impressively bring printed words into a live experience. So, my point is, music requires participation.

I've noticed that there are three type of congregants in our pews. First, there are those who sing all parts of the Mass. They are fully engaged and seek to understand the deeper meaning of how the music connects to the scripture. These folks give me great hope and inspiration. Second, and perhaps the most popular, are those who will sing anything that does not require opening the hymnal. I notice them singing the words of the psalm, alleluia, and Eucharistic Acclamations, but when it comes to the hymns, they do not participate and go into "spectator" mode rather than participate. Lastly, there are those who sing nothing. These are the folks that I wish to connect with the most. I've heard all sorts of excuses by non-singers in the course of my career. We'd need another page in the bulletin for me to go into detail on this, but you've heard me mention this before.

I was recently on an airplane. During the pre-takeoff safety announcements, I noticed that barely anyone was paying attention to the flight attendant. Most of us were either reading or listening to music. Even though paying attention to this exercise is in our best interest, most of us were thinking, "I've heard this all before. I don't need to participate in the instructions again." I felt bad for the flight attendant who was going through all the motions, but making minimal impact. In many ways, I feel the same way when I cantor at Mass. We all know that actively engaging in the Mass is important for our spiritual health, but it takes a deliberate effort to participate. "I've been through this before. I don't need to participate again."

Everyone is involved in music ministry, not just our wonderful cantors and choir members. By coming to worship, we are invited and expected to participate in music. We can have the best music possible on paper in our hymnals, but until we have people to give it life, all that we have is silence. The people that make music determine what music sounds like. The shape and success of music at St. Jane's depends not on me, but on your willingness to sing and to participate in music ministry. My role is to guide, organize, train, and educate you all as musicians in Christ's name. I've said it before and I'll say it again. There is music in heaven, so use your time on earth to practice! I'd hate for St. Peter to be holding singing auditions at the gates! Worship well; sing, participate, serve those around you.

PHYSICIAN-ASSISTED SUICIDE LEGISLATION IN MARYLAND Legislation has been introduced again this year in the Maryland General Assembly—HB 370 and SB 354—that would allow doctors to legally prescribe a lethal dose of medicine at the request of a patient who has been deemed mentally competent and who has received a terminal diagnosis. The legislation is fatally flawed: no evaluation by a mental health professional would be required; there would be no education on the proper use or disposal of the lethal barbiturates; there is no drug take-back plan if the patient decides against taking the prescription; there are no safeguards for the disabled; and no ID is necessary for patients to pick up a prescription in Maryland. SB 354 will be heard in the Judicial Proceedings committee on Tuesday, March 7. A coalition of disability advocates, members of the medical community, patient advocates, and religious organizations-including the Maryland Catholic Conference—have joined together to advocate against these physician-assisted suicide bills, or what its proponents call "Death with Dignity."
