**MUSIC AND LITURGY NOTES**

In today's Gospel, Jesus says, "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light." Most of us will read this passage without any knowledge of what a "yoke" is. The yoke was a familiar symbol of burden bearing and oppression. "Yoke" used in a biblical sense has two meanings. First, yokes were harnesses placed on the necks and shoulders of oxen, and also on prisoners and slaves. By this definition, Jesus would be using the term metaphorically to tell us that through his teaching, his way of discipleship is not burdensome, but life-giving. Secondly, "yoke" could also mean the law of the Pharisees. Using this definition, Jesus isn't speaking of physical burdens. Rather, it was the heavy burden of law that the Pharisees required of people. Later on, in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus will rebuke the Pharisees for laying heavy burdens on the shoulders of the people. The good news is that Jesus promises to all who come to him that he will give them rest from the heavy burden of trying to earn our way into heaven. Jesus encourages those who are "heavy laden" to take his yoke upon them, and in so doing they will find rest for their souls. During these summer months when we take rest from our busy schedules, let us find rest in Jesus. To quote from today's Procession Hymn, "I came to Jesus and I drank of that life-giving stream; My thirst was quenched, my soul revived, and now I live in him."

A big thank you to Andrew Vu, our Assistant Music Director for ministering at all five Masses this weekend – no easy task – while I am away in Germany conducting research for my doctoral dissertation. If you have an interest in knowing, I am researching a German organ builder, Rudolf von Beckerath. Beckerath built several significant instruments in North America whose aesthetics I argue have redirected mid-century trends in organ design and construction. I grew up playing on a magnificent Beckerath instrument housed at the Cathedral in Pittsburgh, thus this is a topic that is near and dear to me. While most of my time will be spent in Munich and Hamburg, I am taking two days to travel to the small town of Konstanz, which I recently learned is where my German ancestors are from. Some highlights of my trip will be having the opportunity to play lots of pipe organs, some of which were played by Johann Sebastian Bach nearly 300 years ago! Please know of my prayers in each of the churches that I visit.

#### **ADDRESSING IMMIGRATION IN MARYLAND**

The Catholic bishops in Maryland issued a joint statement several weeks ago calling for all people of faith and good will to come together in a spirit of compassion, prudence, and cooperation in addressing the issue of immigration. The bishops also urge state and local elected officials to consider several guiding principles when determining the appropriate relationship between federal immigration officials and local law enforcement. In the United States, the Catholic Church was founded by immigrant communities who have always found a home in their local parish. Today, the Church in Maryland continues to welcome and embrace

In addition to the storm on April 21, we also had snow and ice events this past winter.


While the accumulation of snow and ice was not as significant as past years,
