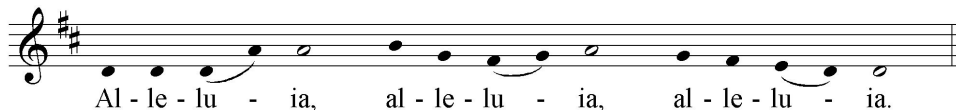

MUSIC & LITURGY NOTES

Last week, after writing a series of articles on the history of Hamburg’s religious past and its manifestation in modern day life, I posed a question asking if people will still be worshipping at St. Jane’s 325 years from now. This can be a difficult thought to discern, especially in a “young” country such as the United States. Secular buildings around us seem to be built and then demolished within a 50-year span. Every so often, a protest might arise to argue for the merits of an architecturally significant structure, but a lot of buildings were not built with a sense of timeless fashion and are therefore deemed irrelevant and replaceable. The key word in all of this is “timeless.” Now, this isn’t all about brick and mortar, but rather what brick and mortar represent. St. Jane’s has what other buildings lack; faith. If we want to be around 325 years from now, we need to continue to foster faith through the timeless traditions of the Church.

After reflecting on this topic, I have come up with two ways to ensure the cultivation of faith that will keep St. Jane’s around for centuries; first, through family life and second, through the liturgy. Faith starts in the family, and as I’ve said in the past, I’m a product of this concept. While I cherish the material possessions that my grandparents left me, by far the most valuable and timeless gift given to me by them is the gift of faith. Not to say that my parents weren’t effective in this regard, but I think most of us will agree that there is a special connection between grandchildren and their grandparents that lends itself to teaching the Christian faith. But what happens when the family faith life is lacking or not present? In this situation, the liturgy steps in.

Faith also grows through the Church’s prayer. Liturgical celebrations, including the Mass, are moments of great devotion and evangelization, and while much of what we experience in liturgy is a Divine mystery, there are ways for our human minds to find a glimpse of the Divine outside of our mortal surroundings. This is where art steps in, more specifically, timeless art. Art inspires the mind and triggers the imagination towards concepts and emotions that are not fully expressed in normal daily life. What makes art timeless? That’s a whole other series of articles, but to be brief, I would say that sacred art is timeless when its sole focus is on the Divine and not on ourselves. The Church knew this early on and was a patron of the arts, both visual and musical. I am in no way a visual artist, but I do offer what I can through musical art to enrich the liturgy. However, musical art is best practiced through participatory traditions. By engaging in song, we take the focus off of ourselves and combine our participation with those around us to form a collective focus on the Divine. Think of some of the Church’s great visual art, i.e. Michelangelo’s “Pieta” da Vinci’s “Last Supper.” Why are these considered timeless? Likewise, a lot of the Church’s great musical repertoire, especially from the Renaissance era, is considered timeless. My thoughts on this matter are far from authoritative and I welcome your own perspective and feedback. May our prayer live on and our song continue for generations to come!

LENT IN OUR PARISH

ASH WEDNESDAY

This Wednesday, February 14, is Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent. Masses will be celebrated at 8:00 am, 11:00 am and 7:30 pm. Ashes will be distributed during each Mass.

FASTING & ABSTINENCE

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence (only one full meal for those age 18-59, and no meat for those age 14 and above). All Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence for those age 14 and above. On weekdays during Lent, there is no obligation to fast, however, voluntary acts of self-denial are recommended.

40 DAYS FOR LIFE: BETHESDA CAMPAIGN

This Sunday, February 11 at the 10:00 am Mass we will kick-off the 40 Days for Life Bethesda Campaign. The mission of the 40 Days for Life campaign is to end abortion through community outreach, prayer, and vigil. Letter-writing to our legislators, owner/landlord of the Wildwood Medical Building (where Dr. Carhart has his late-term abortion clinic), and other business owners nearby will take place in Caulfield Hall from 11:00-12:00 noon. Paper, envelopes, pizza, and drinks will be provided. Signs will be available for those who want to join other pro-lifers in the peaceful vigil in front of the Wildwood Medical Center (10401 Old Georgetown Road) during the 40 Days for Life, which begins Ash Wednesday (February 14) and continues through Palm Sunday (March 25).
